This month has been a very busy one for both staff and students as our pupils in year 5 onwards participated, once again, in the Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition.


Furthermore, the Ellinomatheia examinations took place and we were beyond happy to see our students putting in a lot of effort towards this.

Watching our pupils work hard has made us extremely proud of them and they constantly remind us how lucky we are to be part of this school and this community.





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

The Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition 2024

The Queen's Commonwealth Essay competition is an annual writing contest for young people aged 18 and under from Commonwealth countries. It is the world's oldest international schools' writing competition, established in 1883 by the Royal Commonwealth Society.

Participants are divided into two age categories: Senior Category for ages 14-18 and Junior Category for ages under 14 years old.

The competition aims to promote literacy, self-expression and creativity among youth. Each year, the competition has a theme that participants are encouraged to explore in their essays. Winners and runners-up in each category receive various awards and attendance to a special awards ceremony in Buckingham Palace hosted by Her Majesty the Queen.

The Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition 2024 asked entrants to consider how they deal with adversity, and how community and culture can be used to encourage resilience and hope in a world with a growing number of global issues.









It was a memorable day filled with fun, and proud smiles as many kids received medals for their exceptional performances.

























































































This year our school has been running dance classes led by our Dance Teachers Mrs Sotiria Karafillides and Mr Dimitris Themistokleous.



Holy Saturday -The Resurrection




Holy Saturday is the day between the Crucifixion of our Lord and His glorious Resurrection which symbolizes the triumph of life over death. This day represents the culmination of Holy week for Orthodox Christians, as the day begins with the first resurrection, Proti Anastasi. During the morning service, the church bells are rung to represent the joy and news and the people bang their seats up and down.

In the evening liturgy, the lights are shut in church and at midnight the priest exists the altar with the holy light of Easter which is shared around the church as everyone holds a candle. The priest chants "XPIOTÓS AVÉOTĄ" (Christ has risen) and the people will respond "A λ η θ $\dot{\omega}$ S Avéot γ " (truly he has risen).

On Saturday, May 3rd, our church was honoured by the presence of His Grace Bishop Maximos of Melitini who accompanied father Christo during the morning liturgy of the Proti Anastasi.

Greek Orthodox Easter, also known as Pasha, is the most significant and celebrated religious holiday in the Greek Orthodox Church. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, marking the end of the Holy Week and the beginning of a new liturgical year.

Preparation for Pasha begins at the start of Great Lent. Orthodox Christians fast and pray for the forty days that lead up to Easter Sunday.


The Holy week, is a time of spiritual preparation, including daily church services and fasting. On Easter Sunday, families break their Lenten fast with a festive meal that usually includes lamb, red-dyed eggs that symbolize the blood of Christ and new life, sweet bread called Tsoureki and Cypriot flaounes.

A week before Easter Sunday, Greek Christians celebrate Palm Sunday, Kyriaki ton Vaion. Palm Sunday is an important holiday as it marks the beginning of Holly Week and commemorates Jesus Christ's entry into Jerusalem. According to the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a donkey, and the crowds greeted Him by laying palm branches on the ground. During Palm Sunday services, churches distribute palm branches to the people which are blessed and symbolise the branches laid before Jesus. Palm Sunday is a joyful yet solemn day that prepares Christians for the intense reflection of Holy Week, leading up to the celebration of Pasha.



The Pontian Genocide

May 19th is the day of remembrance of the Pontian Greek Genocide to honour the memory of approximately 353,000 Pontian Greeks exterminated by the New Turks and the Ottoman Empire between 1916 and 1923. On May 19th, Kemal Ataturk landed in Samsun to start the most brutal phase of the Greek Pontian genocide.







Pontian Greeks lived in the Pontus region on the southern coast of the Black Sea. The Turkish authorities forced them to leave their homes and march long distances under brutal conditions.

Many died from starvation and diseases. A significant amount of men were conscripted into labour battalions called tagmata ergasias, and were subjected to hard labour under fatal conditions. Greek churches, schools and businesses were destroyed, effectively erasing the cultural and social structures of the Pontian Grrek communities.



The Pontian Genocide was a devastating period of targeted violence against the Pontic Greek community. In memory of those who lost their lives, homes, land and got separated from their families, our school held an assembly on May 18th to honour this significant historic moment. The children saw documentaries whilst our teachers spoke to them about this tragic event and shared stories about their family members whom were affected by the genocide. The pupils also had the opportunity to watch the video from our school's entry in last year's competition "Ποντιακός Ελληνισμός Μνήμες και όνειρα, παρελθόν, παρόν και μέλλον" in which we won 2nd place. Our school is participating in this competition once again this year and we wish them the best of luck!

St Helen was a wise Empress who loved God with all her heart and together with her son, St Constantine, they allowed Christianity to grow and spread through the Roman Empire after a long time of persecution of

Christians. They lived during the 3rd and 4th Century. St Helen is also responsible for the finding of the Holy Cross

which Jesus was crucified. She died in 330 AD.

Saints Constantine and Helen are celebrated on May 21st of each year. They are celebrated together because Helen is Constantine's mother. Their lives and contributions are remembered for their pivotal roles in the establishment and spread of Christianity.



St Constantine, often referred to as Constantine the Great, is a central figure in the history of Christianity and the Roman Empire. He was the emperor of a large part of the Roman Empire and the first Roman emperor to convert to Christianity. Constantine founded the city of Constantinople as the new capital of the Roman Empire which later became the capital city of the Byzantine Empire until 1453 and the major centre of Christianity. Saint Constantine's life and reign marked a turning point in the history of Christianity, forming the religious and political landscape of the Western world for

centuries to come. He died in 337 AD.
